## **California Water Commission to hear State and local perspectives on groundwater trading at August meeting**

Land subsidence, Water Storage Investment Program also on agenda

At the August meeting of the [California Water Commission](#), staff from the [Department of Water Resources](#) (DWR) and the [State Water Resources Control Board](#) (SWRCB) will provide updates on their respective roles in implementation of the [Sustainable Groundwater Management Act](#) (SGMA), including State activities related to the Commission's 2022 [white paper](#) on groundwater trading. Representatives from the [Mid-Kaweah Groundwater Sustainability Agency](#) will provide a local perspective on efforts to implement groundwater trading practices, and DWR staff will present an overview of DWR's [Draft Best Management Practices on Managing Land Subsidence in California](#).

The meeting is open to the public and will also be live streamed online.

Also on the August meeting agenda, the Commission will consider adopting the proposed changes to the [Water Storage Investment Program](#) (WSIP) early funding regulations, as well as consider inflationary increases to the WSIP projects with funds made available by the withdrawal of the Los Vaqueros Reservoir Expansion Project and passage of [Proposition 4](#) in 2024.
