# Barriers & Challenges Webinar 1 & 2

<u>Understanding Tribes are Sovereign Nations</u> regardless of recognition status. As such have an inherent responsibility to their constituencies & a responsibility of stewardship, or management of traditional territory regardless of local, state or federal jurisdictions.

### **Increase Tribal Engagement in Communication**

- Tribes not contacted, only once, inconsistently, &/or incorrect staff person
- RWMGs instructed to only contact Native American Heritage Commission (NAHC)
- o Tribes unique, multiple departments, & staff persons with multiple responsibilities
- Tribes have traditional territory in multiple IRWM regions &have to stay engaged in each IRWM regions: time/resources - RWMGs have sent Tribes away when overlap
- Tribes historically & currently have been marginalized, underrepresented, & continue to experience "erasure"
- Tribes need to meet regionally with other Tribes in their IRWMs, & with those in adjacent IRWMs

### **Tribes in Governance Structure at Leadership Level**

- Need clear consistent path to Tribal inclusion in RWMGs at decision-making level
- Tribes only included as public commenters
- IRWM requires a time & financial commitment & not all Tribes have resources
- Tribes need opportunity to develop & maintain appropriate representative & alternative structures, or one vote for each Tribe

### **Needs Assessments** (DWR - Requirement Per Prop.1 Bond)

- Final versions being submitted now & not all Tribes were included
- Not all Tribes who completed were given an opportunity to review or interpret results
- Tribes would like to guide IRWM program changes, technical assistance, capacitybuilding, or project development
- What about other Needs Assessments being conducted by SWRCB &CA EPA, will they integrate into the IRWM assessments?
- O What will DWR do with information being gathered if DACTI program is not going to act?

### **IRWM Plan Update** (DWR - Eligibility to submit for Proposition 1 funding)

- Tribes should have been invited to provide content
- Maps in the IRWM Plans, & those shared by agencies do not accurately show Tribal traditional territories, all current Tribal lands, or historical locations of water features
- IRWM Plans should include information on the Tribes in their region should not be just the federal & state recognized Tribes
- IRWM Plans contain goals & may also contain Project lists Tribes should be invited to provide recommendations on the regional goals &to submit projects for inclusion

### **DACTI: Technical Assistance / Capacity Building / Demonstration Projects**

- Not all RWMGs prioritized technical assistance or capacity-building to increase Tribal capacity to participate in IRWM Programs
- Tribes should guide the Technical Assistance they will receive, & approve who will provide it
- O What about support for Project Development?

### **IRWM Project Development**

- Tribal projects have not been selected for funding in all regions
- Some IRWMs unclear on how to submit project submissions, or not giving heads up for Tribes & DACs to initiate project development
- Some IRWM regions are not providing technical assistance for project development
- Some have not prioritized Tribal goals in their IRWM Plans & so many Tribal projects are not be eligible
- Non state or federally recognized Tribes are not eligible for IRWM funding as a project lead. Must partner with a recognized Tribe, non-profit, or another eligible entity
- Unclear if allotment lands are eligible for funding
- Unclear how best to complete projects on federal forest lands

### **Leveraging Funds from Other Agencies &/or Programs**

- Can other Proposition1 programs provide matching funds for Proposition 1 funded IRWM Implementation Projects?
- How can DACTI and/or IRWM programs work with other state or federal programs like Indian Health Service (IHS), State Water Resources Control Board, or CA EPA?

### **Compliance & Requirements - Tribal Project Submissions & Receipt of Funds**

- May take several eighteen months to receive funding after being selected
- CEQA / NEPA hybrid may be needed specialized
- Invoicing, reporting, project close out, & long-term project reporting & management
- Limited Waiver of Sovereign Immunity
- Workers Wage Requirements
- Median Household Income

# Information from DWR

Answering questions on Sustainable Groundwater Management

- The Sustainable Groundwater Management Act emphasizes local control
- State authority is triggered at discrete points in the process
- DWR has published an <u>Engagement with Tribal Governments Guidance</u>
   <u>Document</u> and FAQs on <u>Tribal Government Engagement with GSAs</u>
- DWR Regional Coordinators and DWR Points of Contact (POCs) are available to help connect Tribes and GSAs
- DWR considers public comments on GSPs when evaluating GSPs
- SGMA and IRWM are mutually beneficial and DWR encourages coordination between the two efforts

# Information from DWR

### Funding Info for Sustainable Groundwater Management

- Prop 1 provided \$90 million in grant funding for the development of Groundwater Sustainability Plans (GSPs).
  - In 2016, DWR awarded ~\$6.2 million to counties that had stressed basins to begin the development of GSPs.
  - In 2018, DWR awarded over \$86 million to 78 Groundwater Sustainability Agencies (GSAs) to continue the development of GSPs.
- Prop 68 provided an additional ~\$46 million for the development of GSPs.
  - In March 2020, DWR awarded 52 grants totaling nearly \$49 million in grant funds for the development of GSPs.
- Prop 68 also provided at least \$88 million in implementation funds to implement projects listed within an adopted GSP(s).
  - A draft Proposal Solicitation Package will be open for public comments in September/October 2020
  - Two funding solicitations (funding Rounds) will be administered:
    - Round 1 for \$26 million opening late 2020/early 2021 for critically overdrafted (COD) basins meeting the eligibility requirements and
    - Round 2 for ~\$62 million opening in early 2022 for medium and high priority basins meeting the eligibility requirements.
  - Coordination with Stormwater Resource Plan groups, IRWM groups, neighboring and upgradient surface watersheds and groundwater basins, and Underrepresented Communities are strongly encouraged and a requirement to obtaining a competitive score.



### Sustain the momentum ... Water is everything!

- DWR needs our help & coordination with cross-marketing these great successes and challenges
- All projects must consider areas of Tribal importance
- Site visits are a must (eventually)
- Sharing resources (tribal expertise/intel); i.e. a strategic location/temporary Evacuation location(s); a local cultural event; discuss potential spring rejuvenation project(s) in the area; emphasize meadow restoration; use of local cultural burning expertise;
- Location of accessible water storage tanks/infrastructure;
   consider tribal emergency management planning;
- Importance of water quality specialist position to operate/maintain complex water delivery systems; more jobs, less poverty;
  - Maintain close communications and provide for safety first!!!

# BryAnna Vaughan Water Quality Coordinator Bishop Paiute Tribe

- Building relationships includes building trust, this is difficult if trust has been lost in the past.
- In additional to talking with regional tribal entities, consider asking non-tribal IRWM partners with similar resources (or neighboring entities with similar infrastructure and resource management needs) about their experiences and if they have any recommendations for new members
- Set up a meeting to talk with the regional IRWM staff to ask questions and field recommendations for becoming a new member
- Ask tribes about any roadblocks they have experienced in membership and securing grants
- Talk with tribes outside of your IRWM region and see what's working there that might be applicable to your region and work to implement it



### **Increase Tribal Engagement in Communication: Solutions & Recommendations**

### **Tribes**

- Contact RWMG & self-advocate your needs to participate fully
- If challenges or barriers, contact DWR regional contacts & Tribal Policy Advisor

### **RWMGs**

- Tribal Contact List: Begin with NAHC, then research & continue outreach with regional Tribes
- o Include all Tribes regardless of federal & state requirements. Goal to be inclusive, to respect tribal sovereignty & to receive all related IRWM region information for Plan
- Seek funding for dedicated tribal engagement including who the Tribe has included of the Tribal Council, Administrator, Environmental Director, Tribal Historic Preservation
   Officer (THPO) & other staff as Tribe recommends.
- Support convening of TAC & Tribally chosen dedicated Tribal engagement staff
- "Outreach early & often"
- Consistent Tribal Engagement staff that are chosen by &guided by a Tribal Advisory
   Committee, or Tribal Representative body chosen by regional Tribes.

### **Tribes in Governance Structures: Solutions & Recommendations**

### **Tribes**

- Tribes collectively choose structure & method for selecting representatives who will enter into IRWM decision-making roles
- With other Tribes in your region establish how many seats (with alternates) would be equitable & that you can fill to maintain a quorum
- Collectively advise the RWMG of your recommendations for Tribal leadership in governance structure, & in working groups
- If RMWG members unsupportive, seek support from adjacent regions, regional DWR staff,
   & DWR Tribal Policy Advisor

#### **RWMG**

- Provide clear path to Tribes participation in all bodies & workgroups of governance structure
- Remove barriers as they arrive, & share solutions with fellow IRWMs & DWR

### **Needs Assessments** (DWR - Requirement Per Prop.1 Bond)

### **Tribes**

- Contact the RWMG ask to complete a Needs Assessment, request the report
- Find out what the next steps are to the DACTI program

### **RWMGs**

- If report calls out needs of specific Tribe, submit the draft to named
   Tribe before submitting to DWR

### **IRWM Plan Update** (DWR - Eligibility to submit for Proposition 1 funding)

### **Tribes**

- Review IRWM Plan for your traditional territory
- Find out from RWMG timeline of next Plan update timeline, prepare & submit your Tribe's recommended goals & objectives
- Coordinate your submission with other Tribes in your region through a TAC
- Outreach to Tribes & invite them to update the IRWM Plan

#### **RWMG**

 Outreach to Tribes & encourage Tribal updates to all sections of the IRWM Plan, not only the regional descriptions. Encourage regional Tribes to develop key sections together so document will have consensus.

### **Technical Assistance / Capacity Building / Demonstration Projects**

### **Tribes**

- Ask RWMG what technical assistance is being provided through DACTI Program to address water & waste water related issues, to increase Tribal participation in IRWMs & to prepare Tribes for project submission.
- If minimal to none, contact DWR to provide status, seek outside funding sources & meet
   with other Tribes in California to leverage funds & identify wider solutions

#### **RWMGs**

- Include capacity-building in your DACTI budget
- Evaluate what amount of funds are available & look through Needs Assessments to create a draft Technical Assistance Workplan
- Distribute workplan to Tribes in region with budget & receive additional recommendations &/or Tribal approval of Workplan
- Hire technical assistance providers as recommended by Tribes to provide that assistance

### **IRWM Project Development**

### **Tribes**

- Create projects in partnership: widen project service area & show multi-benefit
- Review Tribal projects in other regions & your IRWM goals & objectives
- Ask for project development support from your IRWM region
- Remember if your project is chosen, DWR can assist you in working through the compliance requirements & you may Consult with the agency officially if needed
- Know that it may take 7-18 months for funding to be available & plan

### **RWMGs**

- Provide project development workshops: include completion of compliance documents
- Incentivize Tribal projects to receive funds: add point(s) to project criteria
- Tribal projects are often multi-benefit projects which benefits your region
- Create shortened pre-application process

### **DWR Support:**

### **Create Primer or Appendix with guidance for Tribes & RWMGs**

### How IRWMs funding can leverage funds from other agencies & programs

- Provide guidance on difference of match & supplemental funding:
  - 1) Can Proposition 1 programs provide matching funds for Proposition 1 funded IRWM Implementation Projects?
  - 2) How DACTI program can elevate Tribal projects on Indian Health Service (IHS) list?

### **Compliance & Requirements: Project Submissions & Receipt of Funds**


- Reduce the time it takes for IRWM Project funding to be available
- Share templates for completing CEQA/NEPA hybrid documentation
- Provide instructions & templates for Invoicing, reporting, project close out,
   & long-term project reporting & management
- DWR does not require Tribes to submit a Limited Waiver of Sovereign Immunity. Agency can provide model MoMUs as alternatives for RWMGs & continue to assist Tribes
- Provide examples of how Tribes utilized Tribal policies for Workers Wage Requirements
- Encourage Tribes to submit a wide range of sources to determine eligibility outside of Median Household Income by US Census

### **DWR Support**:

- Develop matrix of success for evaluating Tribal engagement
- Provide RWMGs with submit to Tribes named in Needs Assessment reports before public sharing
- Request each RWMG provide an updated list of steps that Tribes need to complete to prepare project submissions
- Provide workshops on project development as a backstop, especially for regions that will not put funds into technical assistance & identify additional funds, or Tribal technical assistance in subsequent funding rounds
- Continue to work with other agencies to provide information about how agencies & programs intersect with IRWM – Example DWR & BIA work to develop solutions
- Support Tribes as IRWM leads &/or develop a Tribally-led program
- Support Tribal participation in the IRWM Lessons Learned Conference in development
- Development of a Tribal Caucus of the RWMG Round Table of Regions
- o Identify where a legislative fix is required to address Tribal barriers to engagement
